
Search Time

 You have three minutes to find your ball before it is lost.





Rule 18.2a - Ball Lost



- A player's ball is *lost* if not found in three minutes after you or your caddie begin to search for it. If a ball is found that time but it is uncertain whether it is your ball:
 - The player must promptly attempt to indentify the ball and are allowed a reasonable time to do so, even if that happens after the three-minute search time has ended.
 - This includes a reasonable time to get to the ball if the player is not where the ball is found.



Rule 18.2a - Ball Lost Question



A Committee Member is assisting a player and caddie in searching for a ball in high fescue. After looking for the ball in play for 2 minutes and 45 seconds, the Committee Member finds a ball, but is unsure if it is the player's ball.

The player and his caddie were searching 100 yards away from the spot and begin walking back to identify the ball. 30 seconds later, the player arrives to the ball, marks and lifts the ball to identify it. He then states that the ball is not his ball in play.


Does the player and caddie have any more time to search for his ball in play or is his ball now lost?

No, the time that the player took to identify the mistaken ball is included in search time. The search has now exceeded 3 minutes and his ball is lost.



Ball Moved During Search

 If you move any player's ball (even your own) while searching for it, there is no penalty, just replace the ball.





Rule 7.4 - Ball Moved During Search


- There is no penalty if the player's ball is accidentally moved by the player, opponent or anyone else while trying to find or identify it.
 - If this happens, the ball must be replaced on its original spot (which is not known must be estimate) (See Rule 14.2)
 - If the ball was on, under or against any immovable obstruction, integral object, boundary object or growing or attached natural object, the ball must be replaced on its original spot on, under or against such object (see Rule 14.2c).
 - If the ball was covered by sand, the original lie must be re-created, and the ball must be replaced in that lie.
 But the player may leave a small part of the ball visible when doing so.





Dropping and Measuring Relief Area

 Drop your ball from knee height so that it lands in and comes to rest in the relief area.



- Your relief area is either one or two club-lengths, measured from the reference point (based on the Rule you are taking relief under).
- Measure club-lengths using the longest club in your bag other than your putter.



Rule 14.3b - Ball Must Be Dropped in Right Way



- The player must drop a ball in the right way, which means all three of these things:
 - The player must drop the ball. Neither the player's caddie nor anyone else may do so.
 - Ball Must be Dropped Straight Down from Knee Height Without Touching Player or Equipment.
 - The ball must fall straight down, without the player throwing, spinning or rolling it or using any other motion that might affect where the ball will come to rest, and
 - Does not touch any part of the player's body or equipment before it hits the gound.

* "Knee Height" means the height of the player's knee when in a standing position.*



Definition: Relief Area

- The area where a player must drop a ball when taking relief under a Rule. Each relief Rule requires the player use a specific relief area whose size and location are based on these three factors:
 - 1) Reference Point
 - 2) Size of the Relief Area
 Measured from Reference Point
 - 3) Limits on Location of Relief Area



Measure club-lengths using the longest club in your bag other than your putter



Definition: Relief Area (Cont.)

1) Reference Point

 The point from which the size of relief area is measured.

2) Size of the Relief Area Measured from Reference Point

 The relief area is either one or two clublengths from the reference point.

3) Limits on Location of Relief Area


- It is only in certain defined areas of the course, such as only in the general area, or not in a bunker or a penalty area.
- It is not nearer the hole than your reference point or must be outside a penalty area or a bunker from which you are taking relief.
- It is where there is no interference from the condition from which you are taking relief.






Changing Balls Allowed When Taking Relief

Rule 14.3a - Another Ball May Be Used



 The player may use the original ball or another ball.

 This means that a player may use any ball each time he or she drops or places a ball under this rule. Lost Ball?

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2020 Rules & Procedures Exam Review



All of the following are abnormal course conditions except:

Definition: Abnormal Course Condition



On the par 3 third *hole* at Nassau Country Club, a player hits her tee shot into the greenside *bunker* that is bordered by a yellow *penalty area*. She finds that her ball is **resting on the yellow line** of the *penalty area*, but is also touching sand in the *bunker*. The player **grounds her club on the yellow line**, lightly touching the sand behind the ball, and plays it onto the *putting green*. She takes one putt to finish the *hole*. What is the player's score?

While searching for a ball in the thick rough, a player finds a ball, but is unable to identify it. He informs the players in his group that he is going to try to identify the ball. **Without marking it**, he lifts the ball and sees that it is his and *replaces* it on the original spot. While he is taking a practice swing a few feet away from the ball, **a wind gust** moves the ball slightly. He *replaces* the ball once again on the original spot and plays it onto the *green*. How many penalty *strokes* has the player incurred?

- a. One penalty stroke
- b. Two penalty strokes
- c. Three penalty strokes

Rule 7.3, Rule 14.7a

A player's tee shot comes to rest directly behind an electrical box (an *immovable obstruction*) about 25 yards off the fairway. The player's lie, *stance*, and area of intended swing **are not interfered with**, however, his *line of play* is obstructed by the artificial box. The player calls an MGA Official over for guidance. The Official informs the player that:

- a. He is entitled to free relief for his *line of play* and may measure a one *club-length relief area* from the *nearest point of complete relief* on either side of the electrical box.
- b. He is entitled to free relief for his *line of play* and may measure a two *club-length relief area* from where his ball lies, no closer to the *hole*, and *drop* within that *relief area*.
- c. He is not entitled to free relief for his *line of play*, but may utilize Rule 19 (Unplayable Ball) for one penalty *stroke*.

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Take Home Questions

After a tee shot on a Par 3, a player is taking relief from a cart path and chooses to substitute a new ball, leaves the original ball on the path, and correctly follows the relief procedure. A player hits his tee shot into the right rough where there is a creek that flows from within the course boundary to out of bounds. When the player reaches his ball in the general area, his normal stance is interfered with by a red penalty area stake and a white boundary stake placed next to each other. The player removes both stakes, plays his next stroke onto the green, and replaces the two stakes into their original position. What penalty does the player incur?
