



MILESTONE YEAR FOR THE MET JUNIOR AT NISSEQUOGUE

After completion of the final sectional qualifier round for the Met Junior Championship, to be played on July 17-19, 2012, at Nissequogue Golf Club in St. James, N.Y., it is quite clear that the 100th anniversary of the championship should be historic. Between the strong field of past champions and the impressive layout of Nissequogue, the level of competition is set high for the 95th playing and 100th anniversary of the Met Junior Championship sponsored by MetLife.

Three out of the four most recent MGA/MetLife Boys champions, Peter Kim of Metuchen, N.J. ('08), Mark Reilly of Babylon, N.Y. ('09), and Theo Humphrey of Greenwich, Conn. ('11) are all contenders in the Junior Championship and look to put themselves in the record books for winning both the Boys and Junior Championships. Most recently, Reilly finished as the runner-up in the 65th MGA/MetLife Public Links Championship at the challenging Black Course at Bethpage State Park.

Other distinguishable players coming into the Junior Championship are Ethan Wall from Brielle, N.J., the 2011 Carter Cup runner-up and medalist of the Met Amateur sectional qualifier at Indian Hills. Earlier this month, Will Bernstein from New York, N.Y. won the LIGA Junior Championship at Cherry Valley Club in Garden City, N.Y., and is ready to take on more rounds of competitive match play. At the Shorehaven qualifying round, 2010 Boys Championship runner-up, David Lee-Tolley from New York, N.Y., finished as a co-medalist for the boys division and seems to be in top form heading into the 95th Met Junior Championship.

In the 1933 tournament, three Strafaci brothers - Frank, Ralph and Tom - reached the semifinals. Ralph won the title, while his brothers lost in the semifinals. Frank came back to win in 1935. Speaking of brotherly history in the Met Junior, Butch and Bill Harmon, and Ralph and Frank Strafaci are the only set of brothers that have successfully won the Met Junior.

Players that have the opportunity to live the legacy of the Strafaci brothers are sectional qualifier and medalist Stephen Pastore of Greenwich, Conn., brother of 2-time champion David Pastore; and John Edler of Fair Haven, N.J., brother of last year's winner, Charlie Edler.

So, the stage is set for 100th anniversary of the Met Junior Championship, the nations oldest Junior

Championship. Who will come out as the victor this year? Can Edler or Pastore be the third brother combination to win the Junior? Or will one of the past Boys champions add their names to the record books? Time will tell as the Met Junior returns to Nissequogue Golf Club for the first time since 1978.

About Nissequogue Golf Club



In 1966, a group of businessmen from the Smithtown area got together to form the Nissequogue Golf Club and to create "the perfect golf course." The ravined, tree-studded seashore and rolling countryside three miles northeast of Smithtown on a secluded, idyllic peninsula jutting into Smithtown Bay, bordered by St. James Bay and Stony Brook Harbor to the east and the Nissequogue River on the west, gave them every chance to realize their dream.

The new organization purchased the former estate of William Ryan, publisher of the *Literary Digest* during the 1930s and 1940s, and well known for his political commentary at that time. The Ryan mansion, a white-brick, slate-roof country manor, featured chandeliered halls and a winding staircase to the second floor. The mansion still serves as the clubhouse.

For their golf course, the members turned to local builder C.K. Martin, who had built the new Meadow Brook (1955) and Mill River (1965) courses and added the

beautiful and challenging 17th and 18th holes at nearby Indian Hills. Martin designed a course that fully utilized the ravines and existing stands of trees, many of them more than a century old. For dramatic effect, he placed three tees and three greens on the bay.

The signature hole at Nissequogue is the 17th, a par 3 that runs parallel to the bay from an elevated tee and over an expanse of wetlands.

This strong layout, renovated in recent years by architect Stephen Kay, has been tested just once prior in a major regional championship, the 1978 Met Junior, won by Martin Vybihal 2 & 1 over Bobby Mattiace. Nissequogue will provide a stunning backdrop for the 100th anniversary of the country's oldest junior championship.

94th Met Junior Championship

Surviving six rounds of match play to win the nation's oldest junior championship is not easy, even though Charles Edler of Fair Haven, N.J., made it look so on the last day of competition at Fairmount Country Club. Edler never trailed in his final two matches, ending each of them on the 16th hole en route to winning the 94th Met Junior Championship sponsored by MetLife with a 3 & 2 final victory over Dylan Crowley of Glen Cove, N.Y. It was the first MGA title for Edler, 18, who began his freshman year at Dartmouth College last fall.

In the final match against fellow 18-year-old Crowley, an incoming freshman at St. John's University, Edler won the first hole with a par and was off to the races. Following a win by Crowley at the par-3 fourth hole, Edler won the fifth, sixth, and eighth holes to take a commanding 3-up lead which he would not relinquish.

History of the Met Junior Championship



The nation's oldest junior championship was founded in 1912 by Leighton Calkins, a former member of the MGA and USGA Executive Committees. Over the ensuing years, the Met Junior has produced a number of winners who have gone on to outstanding achievements on both the regional and national levels.

Frank Strafaci, who won the Met Junior at Apawamis in 1935, later became the only seven-time champion of the Met

Amateur. In 1961, Claude Harmon Jr., better known today as Butch, captured the title at Inwood. Seven years later, his younger brother Bill won the Junior at Morris County Golf Club. Both brothers followed in their legendary father's footsteps and became internationally recognized golf instructors. Other well-known Met Area instructors who are former Met Junior champions include Tom Patri Jr. (1976) and Mike Lopuszynski (1982).

More recently, 1994 Junior champion Marc Turnesa won a tournament in his rookie season on the PGA Tour in 2008, and 1997 Junior champion Andrew Svoboda, who captured the 2003 Met Open while still an amateur, plays on the Nationwide Tour. In 2003, Mike Quagliano, of GlenArbor, came within a whisker of winning the Met Amateur two weeks after winning the Junior, losing in the finals on the 37th hole. In 2009, David Pastore captured his second Met Junior title, a feat that only few have accomplished in the event's storied history.


The Junior champion is awarded the esteemed Mandeville Trophy, and it is one of the toughest MGA trophies to win. Sectional qualifying throughout the Met Area narrows a typical entrant pool of 300 junior golfers down to 64, who are then

seeded in a match play bracket. The winner must survive a grueling schedule that includes six matches over three days.

The championship is preceded by the MGA/MetLife Pro-Junior, in which the contestants team with Met Area golf professionals in a competition and also have the opportunity to get an up-close look at the venue for the Junior

championship. Players and their families are then guests at the traditional Junior Banquet on the eve of the championship.
